## Political Proportionality and Allocation of Seats on Committees and Other Appointments - 2019/20

## Purpose

1. To seek Council's approval of the establishment of committees, the allocation of seats on committees and the appointment of Members and substitute Members to committees. This report also requests that Council appoints the Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of committees and re-appoints the Lead Independent Person and Deputy Independent Person.

## Recommendations

2. That Council approves:
(iii) The allocation of seats on committees as set out in Appendix A.
(ii) The nominations of the Political Group Leaders to seats on committees at set out in Appendix B.
(iii) The appointment of Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of committees (To be tabled as Appendix C).
(iv) The re-appointment of Grant Osbourn as the Council's Lead Independent Person and Gillian Holmes as the Council's Deputy Independent Person for a further two years, subject to annual ratification.

## Reasons for Recommendations

3. To comply with Council Procedure Rule 1.2 relating to "Selection of Councillors on Committees and Outside Bodies" and to enable the Council to comply with its obligations under the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 in respect of appointment to committees.

## Background

4. Political Groups on the Council are formed in accordance with the Local Government (Committees and Political Groups) Regulations 1990 when two or more Councillors notify the Chief Executive, as Proper Officer, of their wish to be treated as a Political Group.
5. Section 15 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 imposes a duty on the local authority at its annual meeting, or as soon as possible after it, to review the allocation of seats on the committees of the Council between the Political Groups.
6. The following principles laid down in the Act apply to the allocation of seats:
(a) That not all the seats on the body are allocated to the same Political Group.
(b) That the majority of seats on the body are allocated to a particular Political Group if the number of persons belonging to that Group is a majority of the authority's membership.
(c) Subject to paragraphs (a) and (b) above, that the number of seats on the ordinary committees of a relevant authority which are allocated to each Political Group bears the same proportion to the total of all the seats on the ordinary committees of that authority as is borne by the number of members of that Group to the membership of the authority.
(d) Subject to paragraphs (a) to (c) above, that the number of seats on the body which are allocated to each Political Group bears the same proportion to the number of all the seats on the body as is borne by the number of members of that Group on the membership of the authority.
7. These principles must be applied as far as reasonably practicable. Where adjustments are required to reflect rounding up and down of fractions, the final decision rests with Council, ideally on the recommendation of the Political Group Leaders.
8. The Local Government and Housing Act 1989 requires that, once the Council has determined the allocation of committee places between the Political Groups, the Council must then appoint the nominees of the Political Groups to the committees.

## Considerations

## Political Proportionality and Nominations

9. The current political makeup of the Council's 45 seats is as follows:

## Conservative: 11

## Liberal Democrat: 30

Independent: 2

Labour: 2
10. The political balance of the Council can be calculated by using the formula below:

Number of Councillors in a specific Political Group
Number of Councillors in all Political Groups (45) x 100
11. The breakdown of each Political Group is therefore as follows:

Conservative - 24.44\%
Liberal Democrat - 66.67\%
Independent Group - 4.44\%
Labour Group $=4.44 \%$
12. Each of the Political Groups (formed when two or more Councillors notify the Chief Executive, as Proper Officer, of their wish to be treated as a Group) is entitled to a certain number of seats on committees. This is based upon their Group's percentage representation, as detailed above.
13. The Council's current committee structure comprises of 62 seats.
14. The calculation to determine the entitlement of Political Groups to seats on committees is as follows:

## \% for each Political Group (para. 11 above) x number of committee seats (62) 100

15. The notional entitlement to committee seats for each Political Group is therefore as follows:

| Conservative | 15.1 | $=$ | 15 seats |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Liberal Democrat | 41.3 | $=$ | 41 seats |
| Independent Group | 2.8 | $=$ | $\mathbf{3}$ seats |
| Labour Group | 2.8 | $=$ | $\underline{\mathbf{3} \text { seats }}$ |
|  |  |  | $\mathbf{6 2}$ seats |

16. Fractional entitlements of less than one half are rounded down and entitlements of one half or more are rounded up. So that this process of rounding does not result in disproportionate advantage to any one political group, the aggregate membership of all the ordinary committees must be in line with the proportions on the Council.

## Joint Committees/Advisory Committees

17. Unlike the ordinary committees, the seats on joint committees and advisory committees are not aggregated. Proportionality is applied as far as reasonably practicable on each individual joint/advisory committee. The Majority Group must have a majority on each such committee.

Joint Development Control Committee - Cambridge Fringes
18. Six seats are available on the Joint Development Control Committee - Cambridge Fringes.
19. The notional entitlement to joint committee seats for each Political Group is as follows:

| Conservative | 1.5 | $=$ | $\mathbf{2}$ seats |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Liberal Democrat | 4.0 | $=$ | $\mathbf{4}$ seats |
| Independent Group | 0.3 | $=$ | $\mathbf{0}$ seats |
| Labour Group | 0.3 | $=$ | $\mathbf{0}$ seats |
|  |  | $=$ | $\mathbf{6}$ seats |

## Climate Change and Environment Advisory Committee

20.7 seats are available on the Climate Change and Environment Advisory Committee. The notional entitlement to seats on the Advisory Committee is as follows:

| Conservative | 1.7 | $=$ | $\mathbf{2}$ seat |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Liberal Democrat | 4.7 | $=$ | $\mathbf{5}$ seats |
| Independent Group | 0.3 | $=$ | $\mathbf{0}$ seats |
| Labour Group | 0.3 | $=$ | $\mathbf{0}$ seats |

## Grants Advisory Committee

21. 5 seats are available on the Grants Advisory Committee. The notional entitlement to seats on the Advisory Committee for each Political Group, is therefore as follows:

| Conservative | 1.2 | $=$ | $\mathbf{1}$ seat |
| :--- | :--- | :--- | :--- |
| Liberal Democrat | 3.3 | $=$ | $\mathbf{4}$ seats |
| Independent Group | 0.2 | $=$ | $\mathbf{0}$ seats |
| Labour Group | 0.2 | $=$ | $\mathbf{0}$ seats |
|  |  | $=$ | $\mathbf{5}$ seats |

## Allocation of Seats to Committees

24. The proposed allocation of seats to committees is set out at Appendix A.

## Nominations and Substitutes

25. Council is required to appoint up to five substitutes per committee from each Political Group in a hierarchical list. Council may also appoint substitutes to any bodies where provisions for substitutes exist in that body's terms of reference. The Constitution, in Section A of Part 5, requires that the nominations of the groups be accepted by Council.
26. The nominations of Political Groups to seats on committees, including substitute members, have been circulated at Appendix B. Notice is given that the nominations include proposals for the Liberal Democrat Group to cede a seat to Councillor Douglas de Lacey, an Independent Group Member, on each of the Civic Affairs and the Joint Development Control Committees.

## Mandatory Training Requirements

27. Members are reminded that members and substitute members of the Planning Committee, Licensing Committee and Employment and Staffing Committee may only serve on these bodies once they have received the necessary training.

## Appointment of Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of Committees

28. Nominations for the appointment of Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of committees will be tabled. Council is advised of a proposal to establish co-vice chairmen positions for the Climate Change and Environment Advisory Committee for 2019/20. Recognising the high priority attached to climate and environmental issues as reflected in the Business Plan priority "Being Green to our Core", Council is invited to appoint a Vice-Chairman for Environment and a Vice Chairman for Climate Change. The Vice-Chairman for Environment would deputise at meetings of the Committee in the absence of the Chairman.

## Re-appointment of Lead Independent Person and Deputy Independent Person

29. Article 9.01(e) of the Constitution sets out arrangements for the appointment of one or more Independent Persons to work alongside the Monitoring Officer initially to consider complaints that a Member has breached the Code of Conduct.
30. The Council, at its Annual Meeting on 23 May 2013, appointed Grant Osbourn as the lead independent person and Gillian Holmes as the deputy independent person to assist in the assessment of conduct complaints. These appointments followed a recruitment and interview process and were for the period 1 July 2013 to 30 June 2016, subject to annual ratification at Full Council.
31. Then, at its Annual General Meeting on 16 May 2016, Council unanimously agreed the re-appointment of Grant Osbourn as the Council's Lead Independent Person and Gillian Holmes as the Council's Deputy Independent Person. This report therefore seeks re-appointment of Grant Osbourn and Gillian Holmes to hold these respective positions for a further two-year term of office, subject to annual ratification. The details for the Independent and Deputy Independent persons are as follows:
(a) Grant Osbourn has worked in the private sector for the last 20 years as both national and regional sales manager for three multinational companies. He was previously the independent Chairman of Fenland District Council's Standards Committee for three years and an independent member of East Cambridgeshire District Council's (ECDC) Standards Committee for two years. In 2012 he was appointed as lead Independent Person for ECDC.
(b) Gillian Holmes is a qualified solicitor who has spent the majority of her working life within public service at the Courts Service, responsible for advising 125 lay justices and involved in contributing to the development and monitoring of codes of practice for both magistrates and staff. In 2012 she was appointed as Independent Person to both Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council. She is also the lead Independent person for Huntingdonshire District Council.
32. The Council, at this meeting, is invited to appoint the independent persons for a further term of 2 years.

## Options

33. Council can opt to approve the proposals set out in the report, or agree another proposal that reflects the principles of political proportionality.
34. The requirement to allocate seats according to Political Groups' proportionate strengths can be overridden by some other arrangement, either in relation to all committees, subcommittees and other bodies or in relation to any individual committee, sub-committee or other body, provided that no Councillor votes against the alternative arrangement when it is proposed (a "no dissent" alternative). (Paragraph 26 outlines proposals for an alternative arrangement in respect of the Civic Affairs and Joint Development Control Committees).
35. The Council is therefore not obliged to follow the proportionality rules and may make different arrangements, provided the following procedures set out in Section 17 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 are followed:
ii) Due notice is given in the agenda for the meeting.
iii) No Member of the Council votes against the proposal, although there may be abstentions.

## Implications

36. In the writing of this report, taking into account financial, legal, staffing, risk management, equality and diversity, climate change, community safety and any other key issues, there are no significant implications.

## Effect on Council Priority Areas

37. Appointing councillors to committees, in accordance with the political balance of the Council, and the associated allocation of seats on committees, will enable the Council properly to discharge its functions.

## CAMBRIDGESHIRE AND PETERBOROUGH COMBINED AUTHORITY MEMBERSHIP AND OTHER APPOINTMENTS

### 1.0 Issue

1.1 This report requests the Council to make appointments to the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority for the municipal year 2019/2020.

### 2.0 Recommendations

2.1 Members are requested to make the following appointments/nominations to the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority for the municipal year 2019/2020:
(a) appoint the Leader of Council to act as the Council's appointee to the Combined Authority and one substitute member;
(b) nominate two members, one from the Conservative party and one from Liberal Democrat party), to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee, and two substitute members from the same political parties as those appointed;
(c) nominate one member from the Liberal Democrat party to the Audit and Governance Committee and one substitute member from the same political party.
2.2 That the Chief Executive be authorised to make any amendments to the appointments to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee and the Audit and Governance Committee in consultation with the Political Group Leaders, if the political balance is amended by the Combined Authority between now and the next Council meeting.

### 3.0 Background

3.1 In accordance with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority Order 2017, each Constituent Council must appoint one of its elected members and a substitute member to the Combined Authority. This is normally the Leader. The Council is asked to appoint a member and substitute member for the municipal year 2019/20.

## Non-Executive Committees

3.2 The Combined Authorities (Overview and Scrutiny Committees, Access to Information and Audit Committees) Order 2016 requires the Combined Authority to establish an Overview and Scrutiny Committee and an Audit Committee. The Order sets out the rules for membership. The membership of the Overview and Scrutiny and the Audit Committees as a whole should reflect, so far as reasonably practicable, the balance of political parties of the constituent councils when taken together. The balance is based on membership of political parties, not political groups, on constituent councils across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.
3.3 On 2 May 2019, there were local elections for a number of constituent councils. The Combined Authority has reviewed the political balance on constituent councils and has requested constituent councils to make the following appointments to these committees.

## Overview and Scrutiny Committee

3.4 The Combined Authority agreed that to ensure an equitable representation across each constituent authority, two members from each council should be appointed to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee representing a total membership of fourteen members.
3.5 The implications of applying political proportionality to a fourteen member Overview and Scrutiny Committee are detailed in Appendix 1.
3.6 The Council is required to nominate two members (one from the Conservative party and one from the Liberal Democrat party) to the Overview and Scrutiny Committee for the municipal year 2019/20 based on the political balance set out in Appendix 1.

## Audit and Governance Committee

3.7 The Combined Authority agreed to establish an Audit and Governance Committee consisting of seven constituent members: one member from each constituent council.
3.8 The implications of applying political proportionality to a seven member Audit and Governance Committee are detailed in Appendix 2. The Council is required to nominate one member from the Liberal Democrat party to sit on the Audit and Governance Committee for the municipal year 2019/20 based on the political balance set out in Appendix 2.

## Substitute members

3.9 The Combined Authority has agreed that substitute members should be appointed for each position on the Audit and Governance Committee and the Overview and Scrutiny Committee. Any substitute members should come from the same party as the Member they are substituting for to maintain political balance.
3.10 For the Overview and Scrutiny Committee, if constituent councils have appointed members from the same political parties, those Councils might only wish to appoint one substitute rather than two. The quorum set down in legislation is two thirds of
the total membership. Therefore, it is preferable to appoint two members in case both members are absent from a meeting and need to substitute.

## Conclusion

3.11 All appointments and nominations made by constituent councils will be reported to the Combined Authority's annual meeting on 29 May 2019.
3.11 The political balance calculations in the Appendices are based on up to date statistics given by constituent councils and take account of the outcome of constituent council elections. However, there may be last minute changes in the lead up to constituent councils' annual meetings and Combined Authority's annual meeting on 29 May.
3.12 If there are consequential changes to the overall political balance, the Combined Authority may need to review the membership and the allocation of seats to political parties on the above committees. The Monitoring Officer will advise constituent councils if any subsequent changes have been necessary, and whether any changes need to be made to their nominations.
3.13 The Council is requested to give delegated powers to the Chief Executive to approve any consequential changes to these appointments, in consultation with the relevant Group Leaders.

### 4.0 Financial Implications/Equality Impact Assessment

4.1 In accordance with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority Order 2017, no remuneration is to be payable by the Combined Authority to its members.

### 5.0 Legal Implications

5.1 These are set out in the report. The Combined Authorities (Overview and Scrutiny Committees, Access to Information and Audit Committees) Order 2016 requires a combined authority to ensure that the members of the committee taken as a whole reflect so far as reasonably practicable the balance of political parties for the time being prevailing among members of the constituent councils when taken together.
