






January's Activities

Section 1 & 2 - Alconbury to the East Coast Main Line

In January the construction team has been busy creating a causeway across the lakes west of the River Great Ouse. This will allow a continuous access from the Buckden Road and works around the new site compound at Brampton.

The crossing of the Ouse is a critical part of the construction programme so it early completion is vital.

Further archaeological works and site clearance have also been undertaken. This has required a number of lane or carriageway closures on the A1 around Alconbury and Brampton.

The team has now started to move into their new offices at Brampton.

Section 3 - East Coast Main Line to Swavesey

Work has continued on our permanent compound at Ermine Street, and the team expect it to be ready for occupation early in February.

Construction of our haul road from Ermine Street to the East Coast main line has been completed and plant crossing points (to allow our traffic to cross the side road) have been put in place at Silver Street.

There has been further works undertaken on site clearance and archaeology along the route of the new road

Section 4 & 5 - Swavesey to Milton

Works continued on the construction of the main project compound at Swavesey Junction. The first staff moved into the building on 16th January and they will be joined by more colleagues over the coming weeks.

Archaeological works and site clearance continues to be undertaken alongside the A14 between Swavesey and Girton in preparation for the main construction works.

A number of overnight lane and carriageway closures have taken place on both the East and Westbound side of the A14. This has allowed us to begin installing CCTV and speed cameras in preparation for the implementation of narrow lanes on both carriageways.

Works for February 2017

Section 1 & 2 - Alconbury to the East Coast Main Line

Works at the River Great Ouse will see the installation of a temporary pontoon crossing. This will allow our machinery to access the east side of the river.

Following the completion of the pontoon crossing, a temporary bridge (Bailey bridge) will be erected. This will then replace the pontoons and will allow the regular movement of machines and materials across the Ouse. This access will allow the construction of bridge bases for both the river crossing and the railway crossing further to the east.

Continued site clearance and archaeological works will necessitate further overnight lane and carriageway closures of the A1 at both Alconbury and Brampton during the month.

Section 3 - East Coast Main Line to Swavesey

Once the compound at Ermine Street is completed staff will begin to migrate into this building from our temporary facilities.

Additional plant crossing points will be created on Hilton Road and this will mean a weekend closure of the road between 8 am Saturday 11th February through to 5 am Monday 13th February.

Archaeology is continuing at the site of the borrow pit near to Hilton Road.

Section 4 & 5 - Swavesey to Milton

Once the installation of CCTV and speed cameras is completed, work will begin to implement the narrow lanes on both carriageways of the A14. This will mean a reduction in the speed limit to 40mph in both directions.

The first narrow lanes are to be located on a section of the A14 approximately half a mile either side at the Bar Hill Junction. The activities needed to create these lanes (including white line removal, renewal and safety barrier placement) will take place at night under road closures on the following dates.

Eastbound carriageway 20th and 21st February

Westbound carriageway 22nd and 23rd February

In preparation for work on the first stage of the new local access road a <u>closure of</u> <u>the Avenue in Madingley will be implemented on 20th February</u>. As a consequence of this there will no access either onto the A14 from the Avenue, or into the Avenue from the A14.

Archaeological work will continue at both Girton Junction and adjacent to the A14 near to the Dry Drayton junction.

Site clearance will also continue in preparation for construction works and this will mean a number of overnight lane closures along the A14

A14 / A1 Road Closures

Further overnight closures will take place on both the East and Westbound carriageways of the A14.

Works on the westbound carriageway (Girton to St Ives) are scheduled for Monday 6th, Tuesday 7th, Wednesday 22nd and Thursday 23rd February

Works on the eastbound carriageway (St Ives to Girton) are scheduled for Wednesday 8th, Thursday 9th, Monday 20th and Tuesday 21st February

These closures will allow us to finalise the installation of both CCTV and speed cameras in preparation for the implementation of narrow lanes on both carriageways.

For safety reasons this work has had to be carried out at night under a full carriageway closure of the A14.

Tough Love

Raising Awareness of Unhealthy Teenage Relationships

A 30 minute play followed by a 30 minute, actor led discussion suitable for young people 11+

Following the success of Chelsea's Choice last year, South Cambs and Cambridge City (SCCC) Children and Young People's Area Partnership with support from the Cambridge City Community Safety Partnership and South Cambs Crime and Disorder Reduction Partnership are supporting a tour of Tough Love in March 2017

More about Tough Love

Tough Love is a 30 minute drama designed for young people; that addresses abuse and exploitation in teenage relationships

It tells the story of 15 year old Becka and her relationship with her violent and controlling 17 year old boyfriend Danny. How they met, how they fell in love, how the control & abuse started and how Becka managed to get help

It has been devised by Alter Ego; the theatre company behind last year's production, of Chelsea's Choice. Key points from the evaluation of Chelsea's Choice are included below. Local discussions suggest that Tough Love is a more suitable show for SCCC as it covers a broader scope of unhealthy relationships not just Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE)

After watching Tough Love audiences will:-

- Have a raised awareness of what coercive control is
- Have a raised awareness of what domestic abuse is
- Have a raised awareness of what makes a healthy relationship
- Have a raised awareness of what makes an unhealthy relationship
- Be sign-posted to appropriate help and support

Comments from Chelsea's Choice 2016

Recall of the play by young people after 3 months was high.

Key messages young people took from the play were 'stay safe on line' and 'talk to someone if you have worries or concerns'. There were also a significant number of references to 'stranger danger'

The message I would give is don't trust people that buy you expensive things even if they say they love you. And that this can happen to not just girls it can happen to boys too. SC M Y10

Don't talk to people you don't know or that are significantly older. Also, if someone asks you for inappropriate photos, say no. Even if you are in a relationship, trust them etc SC F Y9

Around 10% of young people said they could not identify 2 people they would feel comfortable talking to about CSE or unhealthy relationships

Young people wanted more follow up work and suggested it should...

Take place in small groups eg Tutor Groups

Take place soon after the show but leave sufficient time for the audience to process what they have seen

Provide information on who to talk to that is specific to the area and not just school based

Provide information on healthy relationships - what is an unhealthy relationship? How to avoid them and how to get out of them Include discussion on other types of CSE

Young people want to know more about...

- Healthy relationships how to distinguish between healthy and unhealthy relationships; how to avoid getting into unhealthy relationships and how to get out of them How to leave the relationship if it's not necessarily illegal, just manipulative and unhealthy. How to escape from someone who wants to get you into an unhealthy relationship, or wants to exploit you
- Who to talk to about concerns about unhealthy relationships and how to have a conversation about relationships

How to tell someone if it ever did happen to me as it is obviously a hard topic to talk about so it would be nice to see ways how people can admit it even if they are scared FY10

Other types of CSE –other than the older man/younger girl boyfriend model

91% thought Chelsea's Choice was a good/very good way to get the message about CSE to young people; this figure rose to 94.5% of girls and 94% of students in Y10.

Staff thought the play was powerful, relevant and engaging

Parents and carers thought the play put over the messages very well and provided an impetus to talk to their children about the issues

Fantastic, gripping and shows how easy it can happen. Really insightful as to what makes a healthy relationship

It is informative, very real and perfectly aimed at young people - brilliant

Agenda Item 7

Dear Members

As you may be aware there have been media reports this week on taxi licensing that have given the impression that South Cambs is very lax in the way it gives out licences to taxi drivers.

This follows a Freedom of information request to all authorities in the East for information on the number of taxi licences granted over recent years by either a Licensing Hearings Panel or Magistrates Court.

The media articles made specific mention of those with serious convictions, including murderers and violent or sexual offenders, being allowed by ourselves to drive taxis. There is absolutely no truth in these claims.

I want to reassure all members that our policies in South Cambs are very robust and in line with national guidelines. Officers in the Licensing team, as well as all members of the Licensing Hearings Panel, are fully aware that the sole licensing objective is the protection of the public.

Officers and members undertake regular training.

Applicants have to make a detailed statement about any past offences, and are also subjected to an enhanced DBS (this used to be called CRB) check which will show any previous convictions/cautions or warnings irrespective of how old they may be.

It can happen that an applicant has committed offences in the past, but they will only be granted a licence if they are deemed to be a "fit and proper person". If there is any doubt the case will go to a Hearings Panel drawn from members of the Licensing Committee.

Should any applicant be refused a licence they have the right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court. I believe our robustness of decision making is reflected in the fact that we have only lost one appeal in the Magistrates Court over the last 2 yrs.
