Please note an update to this week's planned road closures on the A14 between Swavesey and Bar Hill.

The below closures will go ahead as planned on Monday 4th and Thursday 7th to Sunday 10th (5 nights in total):

- A14 eastbound Swavesey J28 to Bar Hill J29
- A14 westbound Bar Hill J29 to Swavesey J28
- A14 westbound to westbound Girton J31 loop

On Tuesday 5th and Wednesday 6th, the closure has been revised to:

- Dry Drayton J30 westbound entry and exit slips closed, along with a lane 1 & 2 closure between M11 J13 and A14 westbound to Bar Hill J29
- The eastbound carriageway will remain open on these two nights

- f) the amount of reserved and unreserved funding.



Section 1 and 2 – Alconbury & Ellington to East Coast Main Line Section 3 - East Coast Main Line to Swavesey Sections 4 and 5 - Swavesey to Milton Section 6 – Huntingdon

Traffic Management:

Sections 1 and 2: Narrow lanes and reduced speed limits will remain in place on the north and southbound carriageways of the A1 for a few more weeks as we complete the surfacing of the new road. The following closures will be used for this work:

<u>A1 northbound</u> - weekend closure from Buckden to Brampton Hut from 9pm on Friday 1 March to 5am on Monday 4 March, including Brampton exit and entry slip roads.

Weekday overnight closures (9pm to 6am) from Buckden to Alconbury on the nights of Friday 1, Monday 4 – Friday 8 and Monday 11– Friday 15 March.

The signed diversion for these northbound closures is via the A428, A1198 and A14.

<u>A1 southbound</u> - weekend closures from Brampton Hut to Buckden from 9pm on Friday 8 March to 5am on Monday 11 March, 9pm on the Friday 15 to 5am on Monday 18 March and 9pm on Friday 22 to 5am on Monday 25 March, including Brampton exit and entry slip roads. A signed diversion will be in place via the A14, A1198 and A428.

Weekday overnight closures Monday 4 – Friday 8 March, Monday 11- Friday 15 March and Monday 18 – Friday 22 March, Alconbury to Buckden.

The signed diversion for these southbound closures is via the A14, A1198 and A428.

Section 3:

Conington Road will be closed during the weekend of Saturday 2 – Sunday 3 March for utility and carriageway works.

Sections 4 & 5:

There will be 7-night closures of both the east and west bound A14 between junction 28, Swavesey and junction 29, Bar Hill, from 9pm to 6am on Monday 4 - Sunday 10 March. This is for the concrete to be poured to form the deck of the new Lolworth bridge.

Narrow lanes and the 40mph speed limit on the A14 between the M11 junction at Girton and Dry Drayton remain in place in preparation for construction activity.







Construction Activities:

Section 1: Surfacing of the A1 continues on both carriageways, with the top layer of asphalt being laid during weekend closures to ensure a high-quality, durable running surface. Gantries have also been erected during overnight closures. Surfacing will switch from the northbound carriageway to southbound, with final surfacing and barrier construction on course for completion before the end of March. This will be another project milestone.

Section 2: Another recent milestone was the transfer of traffic onto the new alignment of the B1514 Brampton/Buckden Road, beneath the new A14 underpass. This has allowed us the begin building up the level of the new A14 over the old Buckden Road as it heads towards the new River Great Ouse (RGO) crossing. The RGO viaduct is now structurally complete and a time-lapse video of the construction of this impressive structure, can be found on our website:

Section 3: Surfacing on the Huntingdon southern bypass has resumed, transforming long stretches into recognisable road. Less obvious, but essential, is the mainline drainage work, which is progressing well, with completion expected in the spring. Work to create the embankments for the new bridge at New Barns Lane is nearly complete and the beams for the bridge are expected to be installed in April.

At Conington Road, we have almost completed the kerb installation, with the road and new bridge expected to be open to traffic in the spring. Works to complete ponds are underway, as are preparations for landscaping and seeding, fencing and access track construction.

Sections 4 and 5: Construction of the new Bar Hill junction is progressing well. Following a series of night closures, the bridge deck is almost complete. One half of the new junction will be brought into operation later this year, after which we will demolish the old bridge. Details will be shared closer to the time.

The new bridge, which will give the village of Lolworth both east and west access to the road network once completed, is progressing well.

In March we intend to open the new local access road between Girton and Dry Drayton. This road will connect to the existing A1307 / Huntingdon Road as it leaves Cambridge. Once this road is open the access from the A14 into the crematorium will be changed.

Carriageway widening continues on the Cambridge Northern bypass at Milton. The green tents, which can be seen in the centre of the road, sit over the guided busway, and are protecting traffic from the debris of the hydro demolition (high pressure water jet targeted demolition) work taking place beneath. Once this activity is completed, we will modify the bridge to accommodate the two extra lanes of traffic.

Embankment and road widening at the eastbound off-slip at junction 32, Milton, will start in late March/early April, following completion of utility diversions on Cambridge Road. Work will include constructing a retaining wall around the north west junction, during day-time hours and will take approximately 8 weeks.

Section 6: Preparatory work continues, including archaeological excavations along the route of the Pathfinder Link road into Huntingdon. Tree removal has begun on a small stretch of Hinchingbrooke Park Road, to prepare for construction in the summer and the footpath between the traffic lights opposite the school and the crossing near Brampton Road will be closed temporarily. This is to allow excavations and diversions of utility cables buried under the footpath.

We'll re-route the footpath temporarily and the lanes of Hinchingbrooke Park Road and Brampton Road will be narrowed during this work, which could take up to 12 months to complete. Some of the work will require overnight or weekend single lane closures. Access to Hinchingbrooke estate, Hinchingbrooke School, Hinchingbrooke Hospital and for emergency services will always be maintained, as traffic light control will be used. Archaeology



Modern technology plays a key part in the post-excavation assessment of the huge range of ancient archaeological finds on the project continues. X-rays imaging is a non-destructive way of exploring metal archaeological finds in more detail, allowing Mola Headland specialists to reveal the true form of heavily corroded items and understand how each artefact was made and to study the features that aren't necessarily visible to the naked eye.

Excavation sites across the project ranged from the very wet to the very dry, so some metal items discovered are remarkably well preserved, while others are very corroded. Finds are arranged on a sheet, as shown in the first picture above, carefully labelled and x-rayed, producing the images shown in the second picture.









As some of these finds have been in the ground for thousands of years, their identity and detail has been lost or disguised, but it can be retraced. The ring pictured above has been placed face-down on the x-ray plate so that any detail on the front will show up on the x-ray. It's not unrecognisable as a ring, but x-raying it allows the team to see whether any small details, facets or decoration are hidden beneath the corrosion on the surface.

After studying an x-ray image, the specialist conservation team may be able to identify an interesting feature, for example an inlay or something unusual about its shape, which might help with dating. The x-ray image can also help gain a better understanding of the items condition.

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A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon, Cambridgeshire: major improvements

Construction work on the new A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon scheme is underway. We are currently carrying out a variety of tasks for which we need to close lanes or carriageways on the A1, A14 and some local roads at times, usually overnight between 8pm and 6am, unless otherwise stated. A clearly signed diversion route will always be in place for closures. For this week, the planned closures are:

Full closures

Monday 4 to Sunday 10 (seven nights)

• A14 eastbound between Swavesey junction 28 and Bar Hill junction 29

Strategic traffic will be diverted south on the A1198 at junction 24, then east on the A428 to re-join the A14.

• A14 westbound between Bar Hill junction 29 and Swavesey junction 28

Vehicles will be diverted west on the A428 then north on the A1198 to re-join the A14 at Godmanchester

• A14 westbound to westbound Girton junction 31 loop

Monday 4 to Friday 8 (five nights)

• A1 northbound between Buckden and Alconbury

Vehicles will travel east on the A428, north on the A1198, west on the A14 and then north on the A14 link road to re-join the A1

• A1 southbound between Alconbury and Buckden

Vehicles will be diverted south on the A14 link road, then east on the A14, south on the A1198 and west on the A428 to re-join the A1

• A14 eastbound Ellington junction 20 entry slip

Saturday 9 6am to Monday 11 5am

• A1 southbound between Brampton Hut and Buckden

Vehicles will be diverted east on the A14, south on the A1198 then west on the A428 to re-join the A1

Saturday 9 7am to Sunday 10 7pm

Offord Road

Saturday 9 and Sunday 10 7am to 7pm

• Oakington Road, Dry Drayton
