2. Traveller Encampments Advice

As we approach Summer please could we take this opportunity to remind Parishes, particularly those previously affected, of the need to take appropriate measures to protect parish land such as car parks, recreation land etc. from illegal encampments. It is important to note the distinction between civil trespass and the criminal offence of damage which does not automatically give rise to section 61.

The Police have discretionary power under Section 61 and 62 of the Criminal Justice and Public Order Act 1994 which empowers the senior officer present to direct people to leave land if certain criteria are met.

The Police can also commence proceedings to move Travellers on if they are obstructing the public highway.

 Under Section 61 of the Criminal Justice and Public Order Act 1994, the police, at their discretion, can instruct trespassers, travellers or gypsies to leave land providing reasonable steps have been taken by, or on behalf of, the landowner to ask them to leave and that two or more persons are trespassing on the land with the common purpose of residing there.

Plus one of the following three conditions must also be met:

- if any of those persons has caused damage to the land or to property on the land; or
- used threatening, abusive or insulting words or behaviour towards the occupier, a member of his family or an employee or agent of his; or
- Those persons have between them six or more vehicles on the land

This Science Festival is a service to the local community and its positive impact is felt by many enthusiast parents and children in our local community. The system will provide a range of information on current and decided applications since 1948, including a brief description of the development, reference number, decision and the date of decision. More recent applications show the name and telephone number of the council officer who is dealing with the application.

Search results are presented in a collection of pages, the number of which depends on the number of results your search produces. There are navigation tools to allow you to browse your results.


