#### **LICENSING ACT 2003 COMMITTEE**

#### **HEARING PROCEDURE**

#### 1. Introduction

- The Chairman of the sub-committee will welcome and introduce everyone present, giving explanations of roles where necessary, and outline the procedure to be followed.
- The hearing will take the form of a discussion to be led by the sub-committee.
- Members of the sub-committee will be able to ask questions of any party, or the Licensing Officer, at the hearing. They will try, so far as possible, to ask their questions at the conclusion of each party's submission.
- The sub-committee will consider any requests for permission to ask questions of other
  parties. It will decide if questions are required in order for it to consider the case properly. If
  permission is given to one party, it will usually be given to all other parties.
- The Chairman may ask any person behaving in a disruptive manner to leave and may refuse to permit that person(s) to return or may permit them to return with specified conditions. Such a person may, before the end of the hearing, submit to the authority in writing any information which they would have been entitled to give orally had they not been required to leave.
- Members of the sub-committee will be asked to make any Declaration of Interests.

#### 2. Witnesses

The sub-committee will consider any requests from any of the parties to call witnesses.

#### 3. New evidence/information

The sub-committee will consider any requests for permission to present new evidence or information not previously disclosed to all the parties and the sub-committee prior to the hearing. The general rule is that such information or evidence must not be considered unless all parties at the hearing agree to it being considered on the day of the hearing. A request may be made for a short adjournment to allow time for everyone to receive copies of the extra information and time to read it.

#### 4. Allocation of time

Each party will be asked for a time estimate for the presentation of their case. The sub-committee will hear all estimates and then allocate each party an equal amount of time to speak.

#### 5. Licensing Officer's report

The Council's Licensing Officer will outline details of the application and representations received by the council. No recommendation to members will be made.

#### 6. Applicant's case

The applicant will present their case first. They have a right to:

- address the sub-committee on any points of clarification the council has sought;
- address the committee generally; and
- call any witnesses that they have been given permission to call. Witnesses may be crossexamined if permission is granted. If this happens, the time taken for questions will count towards the allocated time of the party asking the questions, not the party answering them.

Members of the sub-committee may ask questions of the applicant.

#### 7. Police representations

The Police will make any representations about the application, with the same rights as listed at s.6. Members of the sub-committee may ask questions of the police representative.

#### 8. "Responsible authorities" representations

Other "responsible authorities" (Police/Fire/Environmental Health Officer/Social Services/Trading Standards/Planning Directorate) will then make representations, with the same rights as listed at s.6. Members of the sub-committee may ask questions of those authorities represented.

#### 9. Any other representations

Anybody else making representations will go last, with the same rights listed at s.6. Members of the sub-committee may ask questions of any person who has made a representation.

#### 10. Legal advice

Once all parties have presented their cases to the sub-committee, and the members of the sub-committee have no more questions for any of the parties, the Council's Legal Officer will be asked to outline any relevant legal guidance.

#### 11. Decision-making

The sub-committee will then retire to another room to make its decision. The Council's Legal Officer and Clerk will accompany members to advise where necessary and take notes of the decision.

#### 12. Notification of decision

Depending on the nature of the application, a determination of the case will either be made at the conclusion of the hearing, or within 5 working days. In most cases, all parties will be notified of the decision in writing.

### **Application for a Variation of a Premises Licence:**

# Northstowe Running Festival, Northstowe Western Park, Kingfisher Close, Northstowe, CB24 1BZ

### **Executive Summary**

 The Committee is asked to determine an application for the Variation of a Premises Licence under section 34 and 35 of the Licensing Act 2003, which has been subject to representation from nine residents.

#### Recommendations

- 2. It is recommended that the Committee determine the application for the variation of a premises licence at a hearing pursuant to section 35(3) Licensing Act 2003.
- 3. The Council, the applicant and all persons who made valid representations may agree to dispense with the hearing provided notice is given in accordance with The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 regulation 9.

#### **Details**

- 4. On 22 June 2023, an application for a variation of premises licence number SCDCPL261633 for Northstowe Running Festival, Northstowe Western Park, Kingfisher Close, Northstowe, CB24 1BZ was submitted to the Licensing Authority, and advertised and consulted upon.
- 5. The licensable activities proposed under the authorisation of a Premises Licence are as follows:
  - Hours Open to the Public Saturday and Sunday: 08:00 – 22:00
  - Supply of Alcohol
     The sale by retail of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises
     Saturday and Sunday: 10:00 22:00

- Provision of Live Music (indoors and outdoors)
   Saturday and Sunday: 10:00 22:00
- Provision of Recorded Music (indoors and outdoors)
   Saturday and Sunday: 08:00 22:00
- Provision of Performances of Dance (indoors and outdoors)
   Saturday and Sunday: 10:00 22:00
- Provision of Films (indoors and outdoors)
   Saturday and Sunday: 10:00 22:00
- 6. The application form is attached as **Appendix A**.
- 7. A statutory 28-day consultation period started on 22 June 2023 and ended on 20 July 2023. This enabled Responsible Authorities and 'Other Persons' to make representations towards the application. 'Other Persons' includes any individual, body or business whether or not they live in the vicinity.
- 8. The application was advertised in the Cambridge Independent on 5 July 2023, and the site notice displayed on the premises as required. A copy of the advertisement is attached as **Appendix B** and a copy of the notice is attached as **Appendix C**.
- 9. A copy of the current premises licence and plan are attached as **Appendix D**. There have been no changes to the current licensing plan within this application. The premises licence was first granted on 20 July 2022.
- 10. Trading Standards have no objection to the application. A copy of the response is attached at **Appendix E**.
- 11. Environmental Health have no objection to the application and have agreed with the applicant a condition of 'the Licence Holder is only permitted to hold up to a maximum of 1 x 2-day event at the premises between 20 August and 30 September, and none at any other time, within each calendar year' to be imposed on any licence granted. Currently the premises licence allows for 'one weekend in September'. A copy of the agreed condition is attached as **Appendix F**. Environmental Health have confirmed that they have never received any noise nuisance complaints about this event.
- 12. There were no responses from other Responsible Authorities.
- 13. Representations have been received from nine residents attached as **Appendices G1-G9**. All objectors have been responded to confirming the variation only allows for one 2-day event within a calendar year, providing them with a copy of the redacted application and plan, asking if they wish for their representation to remain, a template of the letter is attached as **Appendix H**. Only one response has been received and that was to confirm their representation remains which is included within **Appendix G1**.

- 14. A location plan indicating the location of the residents who have submitted representations is attached as **Appendix I**.
- 15. There are no policy presumptions within the Council's Statement of Licensing policy, against the grant of the licence unless it can be shown that the application would undermine or prejudice the licensing objectives.

#### **Options**

- 16. The Sub-Committee in determining the application will consider the steps set out in section 18(4) Licensing Act 2003.
- 17. The Sub-Committee will decide whether to grant the licence (imposing all mandatory conditions) in the terms set out in the application or take any of the following steps before granting the licence:
  - a. To refuse to grant the application
  - b. To grant the application with (or without) conditions in full (or in part)
- 18. The Sub-Committee must give the reasons for the decision.

#### **Implications**

19. In the writing of this report, taking into account financial, legal, staffing, risk, equality and diversity, climate change, and any other key issues, the following implications have been considered: -

#### Legal

- 20. The Council, the applicant and all persons who made valid representations may agree to dispense with the hearing provided notice is given in accordance with The Licensing Act 2003 (Hearings) Regulations 2005 regulations.
- 21. When determining applications, the Sub-Committee recognises the Council as the licensing authority is required to carry out its functions with a view to promoting the licensing objectives;
  - the prevention of crime and disorder;
  - public safety:
  - the prevention of public nuisance; and
  - the protection of children from harm.
- 22. In considering the licensing objections the Council must have regard to its statement of Licensing Policy, and to the statutory guidance (Revised Guidance April 2018) issued under section 182 Licensing Act 2003. The application process

is considered at section 8 of that Guidance. The procedure and information on hearings starts at 9.31 of that Guidance.

23. Any party aggrieved by the decision of the Sub-Committee has the right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court.

#### **Risks/Opportunities**

24. The decision creates no additional risks or opportunities in the context of the Council's risk management.

In terms of specific **regulated entertainments** please note that:

- Plays: no licence is required for performances between 08:00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 500.
- Films: no licence is required for 'not-for-profit' film exhibition held in community premises between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500 and the organiser (a) gets consent to the screening from a person who is responsible for the premises; and (b) ensures that each such screening abides by age classification ratings.
- Indoor sporting events: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the audience does not exceed 1000.

- Dance: no licence is required for performances between 08.00 and 23.00 on any day, provided that the

  - (i) Drink a quantity of alcohol within a time limit (other than to drink alcohol sold or supplied on the premises before the cessation of the period in which the responsible person is authorised to sell or supply alcohol), or
  - (ii) Drink as much as possible (whether within a time limit or otherwise)
- (b) Provision of unlimited or unspecified quantities of alcohol free or for a fixed or discounted fee to the public or to a group defined by a particular characteristic in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (i) Provision of free or discounted alcohol or any other thing as a prize to encourage or reward the purchase and consumption of alcohol over a period of 24 hours or less in a manner which carries a significant risk of undermining a licensing objective;
  - (ii) Selling or supplying alcohol in association with promotional posters or flyers on, or in the vicinity of, the premises which can reasonably be considered to condone, encourage or glamourise ant-social behaviour or to refer to the effects of drunkenness in any favourable manner;
  - (iii) Dispensing alcohol directly by one person into the mouth of another (other than where that other person is unable to drink without assistance by reason of disability).
- 3. The responsible person must ensure that free potable water is provided on request to customers where it is reasonably available.
- 4. The premises licence holder or club premises certificate holder must ensure that an age verification policy is adopted in respect of the premises in relation to the sale or supply of alcohol.
  - (a) The designated premises supervisor in relation to the premises licence must ensure that the supply of alcohol at the premises is carried on in accordance with the age verification policy
  - (b) The policy must require individuals who appear to the responsible person to be under 18 years of age (or such older age as may be specified in the policy) to produce on request, before being served alcohol, identification bearing their photograph, date of birth and either a) a holographic mark or b) an ultra-violet feature.



- 5. The responsible person must ensure that
  - (a) Where any of the following alcoholic drinks is sold or supplied for consumption on the premises (other than alcoholic drinks sold or supplied having been made up in advance ready for sale or supply by securely closed container) it is available to customers in the following measures
    - (i) Beer or Cider: ½ Pint
    - (ii) Gin, Rum, Vodka or Whisky: 25ml or 35ml
    - (iii) Still Wine in a glass: 125ml
  - (b) These measures are displayed in a menu, price list or other printed material which is available to customers on the premises and
  - (c) Where a customer does not in relation to a sale of alcohol specify the quantity of alcohol to be sold, the customer is made aware that these measures are available.

    - (iii) V is the rate of value added tax chargeable in relation to the alcohol as if the value added tax were charged on the date of the sale or supply of the alcohol.
  - (c) "Relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a premises licence
    - (i) The holder of the premises licence
    - (ii) The designated premises supervisor (if any) in respect of such a licence, or
    - (iii) The personal licence holder who makes or authorises a supply of alcohol under such a licence.



- (d) "Relevant person" means, in relation to premises in respect of which there is in force a club premises certificate, any member or officer of the club present on the premises in a capacity which enables the member or officer to prevent the supply in question and
- (e) "Value added tax" means value added tax charged in accordance with the Value Added Tax Act 1994.
- 3. Where the permitted price given by paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 would (apart from this paragraph) not be a whole number of pennies, the price given by that sub-paragraph shall be taken to be the price actually given by that sub-paragraph rounded up to the nearest penny.
- 4. (a) Sub-paragraph 2 applies where the permitted price given by paragraph (b) of paragraph 2 on a day ("the first day") would be different from the permitted price on the next day ("the second day") as a result of a change to the rate of duty or value added tax.
  - (b) The permitted price which would apply on the first day applies to sales or supplies of alcohol which take place before the expiry of the period of 14 days beginning on the second day.

#### **Mandatory Condition: Exhibition of films**

- 1. Where a premises licence authorises the exhibition of films, the licence must include a condition requiring the admission of children to the exhibition of any film to be restricted in accordance with this section.
- 2. Where the film classification body is specified in the licence, unless subsection 3(b) applies, admission of children must be restricted in accordance with any recommendation made by that body.



This will create unacceptable nuisance for neighbouring properties (on any side of the sports field, as there are also residences on the Longstanton sides of the field).

Supply of alcohol Saturday and Sunday 10:00 – 22:00. This is effectively all day for both days at the weekend. As there is no specific date mentioned, then the presumption is that permission will be for 'any or all' weekends in the year. This is not commensurate with the specific aim of providing a running event on one weekend per year.

These two licences will create an unacceptable precedent as this is intended to be open space for all to enjoy – it is not an establishment such as a pub or nightclub.

The 'address' of the site is incorrectly noted as Western Park 'Kingfisher Close'. The Close is a private road with no access to the Western Park sports field. It is a narrow road with small front gardens and is not intended for public access or parking or loading/unloading of equipment – such activities have occurred during past events on Western Park. Advertising the event as 'at' Kingfisher Close will mislead attendees into thinking Kingfisher Close is a 'proper and safe' access point – which it is not.

My representation is 'against' this application as the extensive dates/times of the proposed licence will adversely affect the amenity of neighbouring properties and adversely affect opportunities for the public to enjoy the page 6, whilst any event takes place.

Thank you very much for your reply and the attachments - they are most helpful.

If the condition you note below is to be implemented, then indeed it does address my concern regarding the frequency of events and is reasonable in my opinion: thank you for that.

As far as I could determine from 'searching' for the existing licence, the live entertainment and alcohol sessions are each two or three hours and two sessions per day, finishing by early evening (8pm latest). Both licences are proposed to be extended to approximately all day, each day to finish at 10pm. I still think this extension is unnecessary for a running event (the 'last' runner might reasonably finish by early evening) and I anticipate this would cause further nuisance to nearby residences in particular (though the sound does travel for quite some distance).

Your enclosed map shows the 'emergency access' as coming from Mistlethrush Drive, so perhaps the site address would better be described as 'Mistlethrush Drive'. However my concerns noted on my representation form still still apply even to that road - namely the restricted width of the road an no 'on street' parking being available. Furthermore, the access from the road to the playing field is a somewhat narrow footpath perhaps not wide enough for Emergency Vehicles or traders.

Perhaps a better 'venue' for the present or extended licenced activities would be the nearby Park and Ride (more space and plenty of parking with good vehicular access).

In summary, I appreciate the condition regarding frequency of events you will impose, but otherwise my concerns remain.

We have not received any correspondence through the post or other means, leaving us uninformed and unable to voice our concerns in a timely manner.

Furthermore, upon learning about this application, I strongly believe that granting this license would have significant negative consequences for the local community and its residents. I urge you to consider the following points when making your decision:

Noise Disturbance and Impact on Children's Wellbeing:

The field in question is in close proximity to many houses, less than 10 metres from many family homes. Allowing alcohol sales until 10 pm every weekend would likely result in an increase in noise levels and disturbance during the evenings when families, like mine, are trying to relax and children are trying to sleep. This disruption to children's sleep will have a detrimental effect on the well-being of the local community, particularly on the sleep patterns and general comfort of young children. Much research has found that children getting insufficient sleep have more mental health and behavioral challenges than those who got sufficient sleep. These problems include impulsivity, stress, depression, anxiety, aggressive behavior, and thinking problems. There is a risk with granting a license that covers every weekend of the year, that my children, as well as those living in other houses close to the field, will have their sleep impacted for 2 days every week.

#### Children's Health

Northstowe in it's own words (Northstowe.com) was set up with the intention... 'where health and wellbeing are promoted'. Western Park was intended for sports and recreation. No child will want to go and play on the field at the weekend when there is an event on. The alcohol licence starts from 10am, so by 2pm I would not want my children playing football next a group of people that have been drinking for 4+ hours as I do not believe that would be safe for my child, and would likely be very intimidating for them.

#### Parking

There is very limited parking in Northstowe. Previously when there have been events on, residents have been blocked in. In September 2022, my partner was 8 months pregnant and needed to visit the hospital and found that we had been blocked in our drive by people parking where they shouldn't. This has happened every time there has been an event in Western Park.

## Extended Drinking Hours and Public Safety:

The proposed license would permit patrons to consume alcohol until 10 pm, implying that people will continue to gather and consume their last orders on the field well beyond the stipulated closing time. This prolongation of drinking hours poses a risk to public safety, as it increases the potential for unruly behavior, noise pollution, and potential conflicts among patrons. Furthermore, the increased presence of individuals under the influence of alcohol late into the evening raises concerns about the security and welfare of residents living nearby.

## Lack of Clarity Regarding Vendor Locations:

The license application does not specify where the vendors will be located within the expansive field. This lack of clarity raises concerns about the potential proximity of alcohol vendors to residential areas. My Name is Owais and I am a resident of Northstowe adjacent to Western Park where I live with my wife and little kids. I am writing to **formally object** to the premises license application submitted by Northstowe Running Festival Events Limited for the purpose of holding events and selling alcohol **every Saturday and Sunday** on the field adjacent to my property.

We are very concerned that we were not consulted by the organisation making the application, did not receive any correspondence through the post, leaving us uninformed and unable to voice our concerns in a timely manner. This was accidently picked up by a fellow resident who noticed a paper stuck to a tree in a bit of incognito mode.

We think granting this license would have **significant negative consequences** for the local community and its residents. I request you to consider the following points when making your decision:

If there is a general disturbance in any part of the meeting room open to the public, the Chair may call for that part to be cleared. The meeting will be suspended until order has been restored.

#### **Smoking**

Since 1 July 2008, South Cambridgeshire District Council has operated a Smoke Free Policy. No one can smoke at any time within the Council offices, or in the car park or other grounds forming part of those offices.

#### **Food and Drink**

Until the lifting of Covid restrictions, no vending machines are available. Bottled water is available for attendees at meetings.
