## ESTABLISHMENT OF COMMITTEES, ALLOCATION OF SEATS AND APPOINTMENTS

## Purpose

1. To seek Council's approval of the establishment of committees, the allocation of seats on committees and the appointment of members and substitute members to committees. This report also requests that Council appoint the Chairmen and ViceChairman of committees.
2. This is not a key decision but has been brought to Council because only the Council may make this decision. It was first published in the February 20xx Forward Plan.

## Recommendations

3. That Council approve:
(a) The allocation of seats, as set out in Appendix A;
(b) The nominations of the political groups to seats on committees, as set out in Appendix B; and
(c) That the Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of committees be appointed, as set out in Appendix C.

## Reasons for Recommendations

4. The power to appoint the committees rests with full Council. The details set out in the appendices have been recommended to Council by the political group leaders.

## Background

5. Political groups on the Council are formed in accordance with the Local Government (Committees and Political Groups) Regulations 1990 when two or more councillors notify the Chief Executive, as Proper Officer, of their wish to be treated as a political group.
6. Section 15 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 imposes a duty on the local authority at its annual meeting, or as soon as possible after it, to review the allocation of seats on the committees of the Council between the political groups. The Council may carry out such a review at any other time and may do so if requested by a political group.
7. The following principles laid down in the Act apply to the allocation of seats:
(a) that not all the seats on the body are allocated to the same political group;
(b) that the majority of the seats on the body is allocated to a particular political group if the number of persons belonging to that group is a majority of the authority's membership;
(c) subject to paragraphs (a) and (b) above, that the number of seats on the ordinary committees of a relevant authority which are allocated to each political group bears the same proportion to the total of all the seats on the
ordinary committees of that authority as is borne by the number of members of that group to the membership of the authority; and.
(d) subject to paragraphs (a) to (c) above, that the number of the seats on the body which are allocated to each political group bears the same proportion to the number of all the seats on that body as is borne by the number of members of that group to the membership of the authority.
8. These principles must be applied as far as is practicable. Where adjustments are required to reflect rounding up and down of fractions, officers will make recommendations as to which figures best meet the principles, but the final decision rests with Council on the recommendation of the political group leaders.
9. Councillors who do not join a group will have no entitlement to seats on committees and do not have to be allocated seats on any committee. Seats can be allocated to these Members, however, at the discretion of the Council. Council, on 22 May 2008, resolved that "every non-Executive Member of the Council shall be afforded the opportunity to sit on at least one of the following Council bodies:"
(a) Planning Committee;
(b) Licensing Committee, Licensing Committee (2003 Act), Licensing Committee (2005 Gambling Act);
(c) Scrutiny and Overview Committee;
(d) Policy Development Committee [since disbanded];
(e) Employment Committee;
(f) Electoral Arrangements Committee;
(g) Audit Panel [now Corporate Governance Committee]."
10. The 2008 resolution in effect makes provision for non-group members to be offered seats on certain Council bodies, but these seats must be offered from within the allocations made to political groups and are not additional to the initial allocation. It is a matter for the political groups to determine which seats will be offered to which nongroup members. Non-group members may lobby political groups for particular appointments, but cannot be guaranteed seats on their preferred bodies.
11. Although the appointment of non-group members to any bodies technically upsets the political balance calculations, these appointments may be made by the Council so long as there is no dissent expressed by any councillor (a "no dissent" alternative).
12. The Local Government and Housing Act 1989 requires that, once the Council has determined the allocation of committee places between the political groups, the Council must then appoint the nominees of the political groups to the committees.

## Considerations

## Political Proportionality and Nominations

13. The political balance of the Council can be calculated by using the simple formula below (to two decimal places);

No. of Political Group Members x 100
57 Councillors
14. Each of the political groups (formed when two or more councillors notify the Chief Executive, as Proper Officer, of their wish to be treated as a group) is entitled to a certain number of seats on committees. This is based upon their group's percentage representation on the Council as a whole, as detailed above.
15. The calculation to determine the entitlement of political groups to seats on committees is as follows:
$\frac{\% \text { from Table } 1 \text { (above) }}{100} \times$ Total No. of Seats Available (xx recommended)
16. After undertaking the above calculation for each of the political groups represented on the Council, the notional entitlement to seats is as follows:
Conservative - xx
Liberal Democrat - xx
Independent Group - xx
TOTAL - xx
17. Appendix A shows a rounded allocation of seats to each political group. If necessary, this must be manually adjusted to ensure that the number of seats allocated to a particular political group does not exceed their entitlement. The political group leaders have met and negotiated any manual adjustments required, and the offer of seats to non-group members.

## Nominations and Substitutes

18. On 27 May 2010, Council resolved that, at the Annual General Meeting, Council will also appoint up to four substitutes per committee from each political group in a hierarchical list to all Council committees and sub-committees other than the Standards Committee. Council may also appoint substitutes to any joint bodies where provisions for substitutes exist in that body's terms of reference. Substitutes must be a member of the same political group as the member for whom they are substituting (Council Standing Order 4.1). The Constitution, at Part 5, Section A, requires that the nominations of the groups be accepted by Council (other than in the case of the Standards Committee). The nominations of political groups to seats on committees, including substitute members, are set out in Appendix B.

## Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen

19. Council is requested to appoint the Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of committees and the nominations to these positions are set out at Appendix C. Where more than one nominee has been proposed, the Chairman of Council shall preside over the election of Chairmen and Vice-Chairman of Council bodies or, in the Chairman's absence, the Chief Executive will preside (Standing Order 7.2).

## Mandatory Training Requirements

20. Political groups have been reminded that members and substitute members of Planning, Licensing and Employment may only serve on these bodies once they have received the necessary training.

## Options

21. The requirement to allocate seats according to political groups' proportionate strengths can be overridden by some other arrangement, either in relation to all committees, sub-committees and other bodies or in relation to any individual committee, sub-committee or other body, provided that no councillor votes against the alternative arrangement when it is proposed (a "no dissent" alternative).

## Consultations

23. Consultation has been undertaken in respect of this report with the Leaders of each of the political groups represented on the Council. Their agreement has been obtained to the calculations relating to the allocations of seats on committees and their respective nominations have been put before Council for approval.

## Effect on Strategic Aims

25. Appointing members to the committees, in accordance with the political balance of the Council, and the associated allocation of seats on committees, will enable the Council to properly discharge its functions.

## Conclusions / Summary

26. The Council is recommended to confirm the calculations relating to the allocation of seats on committees and to appoint the nominations of political groups to committees. In addition, the Council is recommended to appoint the Chairmen and Vice-Chairmen of Committees.
