

Parish Council Clerk: It is with much sadness that I have to report that at the beginning of May 2012 Margaret Sharp will not be renewing her contract as Clerk for Longstowe Parish Council. Margaret would have worked for the Parish Council for three years and her knowledge and expertise will surely be missed by all. I want to wish Margaret all the best and thank her personally for all her hard work and support over the last few years.

Speed Limit Reduction A1198: At various meetings the Council have been reviewing the speed limit reduction on the A1198. The Clerk has reported on the guidance received from CCC, and it has been agreed to progress with the speed limit reduction and instigate an official consultation process. The Clerk has sent the consultation letter to the list of consultees provided and an estimate of costs is in the process of being obtained.

Parish Plan: Following discussing with the Village Hall, the Council have agreed to defer the production of a Parish Plan until changes due through the Localism Agenda are clear.

Police New Telephone Number: You can now contact Cambridgeshire Constabulary on 101 for all non-emergency calls. The 0345 456 456 4 number will remain in use alongside 101 for several months to allow people time to get

used to the new number. The change comes part of a national programme to make 101 the single non-emergency number in England and Wales, giving residents an easy-to-remember number to contact local police wherever they are. The call system is designed to recognise where you are calling from and connect you with the local police service. If you did not want to speak to your local force, or the force area you are in, you will be given the option to be connected to different one. The number change does not affect the way that calls are handled and the force will continue to take non-emergency calls 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Please continue to call 999 when an immediate response is needed because a crime is happening, someone suspected of a crime is nearby, or someone is in danger.

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service (CFRS): To ensure we reach as many people as possible, we want to take our work right into the heart of local communities by using local people, who know their community best, to spread our safety messages. CFRS is launching this exciting new Community Champion Scheme to enhance complement the role of our staff in creating a safer Cambridgeshire for all. We are looking for volunteer Community Champions who:

- Have good interpersonal skills and are able to communicate with a wide range of people.
- May have experience of working or volunteering with people in the community.
- May have established community links or a broad range of community contacts
- Can give us at least 4 hours commitment every month. Specific days and times are flexible and you will discuss and agree these with our Community Champion Scheme Co-ordinator.

Longstowe Parish Council: Parish Clerk Vacancy (Part-time)

The Council is seeking to appoint an enthusiastic person to fill the post of Parish Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer (RFO). This is a great opportunity for a local person who wishes to work flexible hours from home plus one evening meeting each month (excluding August). Training can be provided and is highly recommended, and further details on the post including duties can be provided by contacting Zoe Burton, Chairperson zoeburton74@googlemail.com If you are interested then please contact the Council by the end of January.

Hours of work are approx. 3 to 4 hours a week. The salary is on an hourly rate and is to be agreed but would be in the region of £8.34 per hour. There will be a three month trial period (before a full contract is given) and at the end of the three months immediate notice can be given by either side. The full contract is for one year in the first instance and then renewable by mutual agreement. It is difficult to give a set date for responses/ interviews as the position needs to be filled as soon as possible to allow hand over before the beginning of May 2012.

Re-ablement

Being independent following an operation or illness

If you or someone you care for requires social care support following an illness or operation, this would traditionally have been provided by a care assistant providing direct care to the person in need.

Since September 2010 a new service, re-ablement, has been providing support to enable older people who have poor physical or mental health following illness or an operation to live in their own homes.

Re-ablement programmes can last for as little as a few days and generally don't exceed six weeks. The ethos of re-ablement is to encourage people to do things for themselves rather than having things done for them. There is no charge to the individual as long as they are participating in the programme.

Re-ablement is now being offered to a wider client group including new service users with a physical disability and new occupational therapy referrals. Future development of the service will look at assisting older people who already have a care package but due to illness or physical issues may now require a higher level of support.

The visitors were soon busy looking at photos of long gone buildings and landmarks, census reports and old maps. There were light refreshments available, the consumption of which gave visitors the chance to sit at tables and share their own memories with others

On show were documents relating to Golden Miller, the famous racehorse, together with memorabilia relating to his history with records of his racing achievements.

Many former residents returned to Longstowe

for the event, to enjoy the chance to renew old friendships and join in with the whole happy atmosphere of the afternoon.

Mr Steve Owen deserves recognition for his part in making the event so very interesting. He had very kindly gone to much trouble to bring us a fantastic display of items relating to the history of Old North Road Station. Mr Owen had assembled a magnificent display of railway related items so varied as to include cast iron signs, parts of signalling equipment, photographs, timetables and reprints of related press items.

Village history adds depth to living here and connects one with the richness of the past, and clearly is a very popular subject here. Thank you so very much to those who gave of their time and experiences to make this event possible. Despite not having been arranged as a fund raiser, a figure of £70 was raised, which was donated to Longstowe Village Hall.

LONGSTOWE VILLAGE HISTORY GROUP?

Would you be interested in forming or joining a **Longstowe Village History Group**? Nothing of a very formal nature, just getting together from time to time to share stories, information and research, and to discover more about our village.

In addition, there is an exciting opportunity now and during the next five years, for archeological research in the locality, which is being promoted by the 'Jigsaw Project'. This is a community project set up by Cambridgeshire County Council in collaboration with Oxford Archaeology East and funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund to investigate, research and help protect the county's archaeology. Its job is to support and enable local people to do local research on the 'ground', investigating and documenting places such as the sites of old houses and buildings, middens (old rubbish tips!), pond sites, ridge and furrow, moats and ditches - anywhere which looks as though it might throw up new information about the history of the neighbourhood (bear in mind that first and foremost, of course, the permission of the landowner to undertake any such research must be sought, and details of all intended investigation supplied). Training will to be provided by the project and equipment made available – have a look at the list of workshops which they hope to run.

Church News

When I was little I used to get so excited when December began because it meant that Christmas was on its way, the advent calendar could be started and the Christmas list pinned up in prominent place. Now I'm a parent myself I'm more likely to groan inwardly at all the jobs, events and expense to be crammed in, on top of ordinary life, in the next four weeks. Why do we do it?

Those of us with small children often want them to enjoy the same sparkle and wonder and excitement that we remember from our earliest years, but even when we're not having imaginary conversations with Father Christmas about our child's good/bad behaviour, and answering questions about how the reindeer know which house to go to next, we still seem to feel some sort of anticipation about Christmas; we sense something important is about to happen; we expect Christmas Day to feel different. Why should this be so?

Is it because we are easily manipulated by the advertising and consumer hype that makes Christmas into a secular festival of acquisition, and we're simply looking forward to a mid-winter binge?

Or is it rather that, as humans, we have the capacity to hope? We long for goodness and for a better life; we desire good relationships and peace; we wish for a clear direction in life and guidance. And whether or not we profess to be Christians, the Christmas story offers this sort of hope. The hope of a new beginning, a better world, the righting of wrongs and the triumph of good over evil.

I'm often frustrated by the way that the good news about Jesus' arrival is sidelined by the good news of two-for-the-price-of-one offers on Christmas decorations etc, but what keeps me enthusiastic about Christmas is the sign of hope that is offered to us by that spectacular birth. Jesus was born in squalid conditions, far from home in about as hopeless a situation as you could imagine. The message for us is that there is nowhere that God won't go; nowhere that's too unpleasant or mucky or distasteful for God to make special; no one who is beneath (or above) God's loving gaze. That's the amazingly hopeful good news of Christmas, and it doesn't depend on Santa's reindeer to be delivered!

I wish you a happy and holy Christmas time.

The beginning of another year – and after recovering from the rush, over-indulgence and fun of Christmas it is that time when we all think of New Year's Resolutions, and just how long we might be able to keep up those promises to ourselves that we will eat less/exercise more/watch less telly/spend more time with family/give up smoking etc etc. It does seem that most of us make resolutions without any expectation that we will be able to keep them, almost like we set ourselves up for failure before we've even begun.

But Jesus can take all our hopes and failures and transform them into something special. January is the month in which the Church celebrates the Feast of the Epiphany, when the 3 wise men arrive to see Jesus and he is revealed to the world outside Israel, bringing light to everyone. With the coming of Jesus light has dawned in the world, scattering the things that keep us in darkness, like failures and disappointments.

Many find the short days and long nights of winter hard enough to bear but if there was no light at any time life would be impossible.

Epiphany reminds us of a light more powerful, more important and more special than even the sun. However dark and gloomy life and the world may sometimes appear, God's light will continue to shine, no matter what.

So whether you manage to keep your New Year's Resolutions for the whole of January (or the whole year!) or not, or whether you don't keep them at all, we still have God's light and Jesus is still with us every day of our lives.




