3. Zero Carbon Communities Grant

The Zero Carbon Communities grant will be launched on Monday 5 August and will offer grants of between £1,000 and £15,000 for local groups and parish councils to spend on activities that reduce carbon emissions, reliance on fossil fuels and also engage communities. Applications for the 1st round of the scheme will need to be submitted by 31 October. **4. News from the Police and Crime Commissioner - UN World Day Against Trafficking by Police Commissioner**

*What follows is a news release from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.*

Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite is today (Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> July) calling on members of the public to spot the signs of human trafficking and to report any suspicious behaviour to the police.

Victims of human trafficking or modern slavery often show signs of physical or psychological abuse, fear of authorities, and carry out irregular activity at homes or addresses. They often have poor living conditions and work long hours for little or no pay.

In Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, victims of trafficking and modern day slavery are able to receive support from Victim and Witness Care Co-ordinators, funded by the Commissioner. Victim Care Coordinators join police officers and multi-agency colleagues on police operations and checks on houses of multiple occupancy (HMOs). Their input has changed the way these visits are approached; treating people as victims first, not criminals, educating them of their rights and supporting them to seek help.

Support offered includes liaison between agencies and service providers and/or signposting or referral to locally commissioned services. It can also include housing or financial management and support to return to victims home countries.

In 2017/18 a total of 252 victims accessed support.

One of the posts is job-shared by a Lithuanian and a Romanian-speaking member of staff enabling the wider Victim and Witness Hub to support both nationalities in their native language and many others through common languages.

**Case study:** Peter (not his real name) came to the UK from Lithuania after being promised work and accommodation however once he arrived in the country, he had his passport taken. A bank account was opened in his name without him having access. He was made to work long hours but only allowed a small amount of money per week from his wages. If he wanted to leave the house he had to tell the exploiters exactly where he was going and what he was doing, and if he didn't, he would be beaten up. He managed to jump onto a random bus, which happened to be going to Peterborough. Once there, he slept rough until the Victim Care Coordinators became aware of him. He was put up in a hotel and provided with clothes and toiletries. The Care Coordinators were able to deal with the bank on his behalf and get to his last wage before it was taken by the exploiters.

“When he came into contact with us, he was completely broken and kept saying that he had nothing left to live for,” Care Coordinator, Alina Jablonske explains, “the beatings that he was subjected to were humiliating and the loss of freedom affected him so much that it was too much for him to deal with.”

P has now chosen to go back home. Alina adds: “We arranged his travel and stayed with him until he got on the plane. Once back in Lithuania, P told me that the fact he was able to have support from a Lithuanian speaker helped build his confidence and restore his faith.

Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite said: “Throughout the whole support relationship, the Care Coordinators advocate on their victim’s behalf in a manner which empowers them to make their own choices. They provide specialist expertise to police officers and staff to make sure migrant victims of trafficking are dealt with sensitively. We all have a part to play in stopping this exploitation from happening. By reporting suspicions you could be saving lives.”

DCI Alan Page, the Constabulary’s tactical lead for modern slavery and human trafficking, said:

“Tackling modern slavery is a force priority and while we’re working hard to address it, we can’t do it alone. Increasing information in modern day slavery and human trafficking is key to protecting the vulnerable. We work closely with partners, including the National Crime Agency (NCA) and the Gangmasters and Labour Abuse Authority (GLAA).

“Slavery still exists in Cambridgeshire and it’s important that people are aware of the signs of modern slavery and human trafficking, and report any concerns to us.”

**5. News from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner: Further details of proposed new police station for South Cambridgeshire published**

*What follows is a news release from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner.*

Police and Crime Commissioner, Jason Ablewhite has today (Tuesday 30th July) made further information available on his website in support of his proposal to build a new police station in Milton, Cambridge.

The information, published on the Commissioner’s website, formalises the proposal to build a new southern police station at the request of Chief Constable Nick Dean and includes: papers concerning the operational need for the new station and background about how the search for a suitable site was carried out, followed by a Business Case to be approved at meeting.

Over the last few weeks, members of the public were invited to give their early views on the proposal, views which are being considered in advance of planning application.

The Commissioner said: “I am grateful to everyone who has taken the time to let me know their views about my proposal to build a new police station in Milton and would like to thank people for raising concerns. Whilst the majority of people taking part in the survey understand the operational need behind my proposal, there have been a number of concerns put forward including increased traffic, noise pollution, greenbelt concerns, and public safety. Those concerns will help inform future consultation on the project in the weeks to come.”

Chief Constable Nick Dean added: “The business case formalises the operational need for a new police station in the south of the county, in order to future proof our ability to police Cambridgeshire, given the level of growth anticipated in the surrounding areas and the changing nature of crime and demand on our services, while maintaining a police station presence in the city centre.”

## **A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon, Cambridgeshire: major improvements**

Construction work on the new A14 Cambridge to Huntingdon scheme is underway. We are currently carrying out a variety of tasks for which we need to close lanes or carriageways on the A1, A14 and some local roads at times, usually overnight between 8pm and 6am, unless otherwise stated. A clearly signed diversion route will always be in place for closures.

For this week, the planned closures are:

### Full closures

Monday 29 July to Sunday 4 August (seven nights)

- A14 eastbound St Ives junction 26 to M11 southbound junction 14

Vehicles will be diverted south on the A1198, then east on the A428 to re-join the A14 eastbound or continue on the A1303 to re-join the M11 southbound

Monday 29 July to Friday 2 August (five nights)

- A14 eastbound between Ellington junction 20 and Brampton Hut junction 21

Vehicles will be diverted east on the A605 then south on the A1(M) to the A605 to re-join the A14 at junction 21.

- A14 westbound Brampton Hut junction 21 to Ellington junction 20

Vehicles will be diverted north on the A1(M) then travel west on the A605 to re-join the A14 at junction 13

Monday 29 July to Thursday 1 August (four nights)

- A1 southbound between Alconbury and Brampton Hut

Vehicles will be diverted south on the A14 link road, then east on the A14 to re-join the A1 at Brampton Hut

- A14 westbound Swavesey junction 28 between exit and entry slips

Vehicles will be diverted via an 'up and over' using the exit and entry slip to re-join the A14 westbound

Friday 2 (one night)

- Rusts Lane (underneath A1 viaduct)

Friday 2 9pm to Monday 5 5am

- A1 southbound between Alconbury and Brampton Hut

Vehicles will be diverted south on the A14 link road, then east on the A14 to re-join the A1 at Brampton Hut

Saturday 3 7am to 7pm

- Conington Road

Saturday 3 7am to 7pm and Sunday 4 7am to 7pm

- A1198 Ermine Street

Vehicles wishing to travel south will be diverted east on the A14 to Histon junction 32, where they can join the A14 westbound and the A428 to re-join the A1198 at Caxton Gibbet.

Vehicles wishing to travel north will follow this diversion in reverse.

Saturday 3 to Sunday 4 (two nights)

- A14 westbound Swavesey junction 28 between exit and entry slips

Vehicles will be diverted via an 'up and over' using the exit and entry slip to re-join the A14 westbound

Saturday 3 (one night)

- A14 Milton junction 33 gyratory eastern side (between eastbound entry slip and westbound exit slip)
