

APPENDIX A

COMMUNITY AND CULTURAL STRATEGY 2007-2012

- 1 A positive consequence of the reduced resources in Community Services at South Cambs District Council has been the need to look more closely at how community development, sports development and arts development officers deliver their programmes of work and develop the most effective ways of achieving results.
- 2 This includes the continued development of strong partnership working and a crosscutting approach to the work we do to confirm that the services received by residents of South Cambridgeshire are the best that can be delivered within existing resources. This builds on the Council's strong enabling tradition where it achieves good practice through good working with a wide range of other statutory and voluntary service providers.
- 3 This Community and Cultural Strategy shows the Council's commitment to achieving a better quality of life for all its residents. South Cambridgeshire residents rate their district as being one of the best places in the country to live and a recent MORI poll (2005) highlighted it as one of the top five happiest places to live. Our service contributes significantly to this perception and we can only retain this reputation by continuing to develop our services. This Strategy looks at ways of improving the quality of life for all residents and particularly looks at ways to add value, increase community activity and participation and ensure that everyone benefits. This often involves positively working with specific groups to increase opportunities and reduce barriers that might affect quality of life, both now and into the future.
- 4 Within this Community and Cultural Strategy we confirm our priorities and actions for the next 5 years. We show how these link with our corporate priorities, government priorities and those of partner organisations. The priority headings for the Community and Cultural Strategy are:
 1. **Active, safe and healthy communities**
 2. **Good access to services and enabling communities**
 3. **Successful new communities**
- 5 We show how these three priorities are reflected in the programmes and projects we deliver linked to the emerging **Sustainable Community Strategy for South Cambridgeshire 2007-2010** (currently out for consultation this will replace the existing Community Strategy.)
- 6 It is important that actions we are delivering on the ground, in our communities, can show a clear line of progression in the way in which they link to the priorities of the Sustainable Community Strategy which in turn links to the priorities in the Local Area Agreement.

7 At the heart of these linkages and priorities are the residents of South Cambridgeshire who enjoy and expect to continue to enjoy an excellent quality of life with delivery of services that they can feel they have some say in planning.

8 It is no accident that the Community and Cultural Strategy reflects the first three priorities of the existing Community Strategy)

The existing six priorities are:

1. Active Safe & Healthy Communities
2. Good Access to Services
3. Successful new Communities
4. A prosperous district
5. A good environment
6. Quality homes for all

9 In turn this links to the **Cambridgeshire Local Area Agreement**, which has four blocks of activity;

1. Children and young people
2. Safe and stronger Communities
3. Healthier communities and older people
4. Economic Development

10 This new Strategy also shows the Councils commitment to the provision of cultural services and is a response to heightened status of culture within national, regional and local agendas. This includes helping deliver the **Living East Cultural Strategy, A Better Life**.

11 The **2012 Olympics** will bring with them a considerable “offer” of cultural resources for both sport and the arts involving a wide range of initiatives and opportunities to benefit our residents.

12 In addition, the Council is committed to supporting the **Regional Commentaries for Culture** and the **Cambridgeshire Cultural Strategy for Young People**, both of which are the result of government initiatives being delivered locally and led by Cambs County Council.

13 The Councils **Community Capital Grants Programme** has for many years played a vital role in improving the quality of life of those people living in South Cambs. One of the Council’s greatest successes over the past 15 years has been the enabling capital support which has helped build hundreds of new community centres, sports facilities, play areas and arts facilities across the district. This has been used to attract many million pounds into the district from external funding agencies and has “helped local people to help themselves”. Our current Capital Grants Programme is widely recognised as good practice and value for money.

14 The Community Services Section plays a key role in the planning for and delivery of **new communities** across the district. This includes the planning for

a wide range of community and cultural facilities and public open spaces as well as over-seeing community development work in each major growth area. The major sites we are currently involved with include Cambourne, Arbury Park, Trumpington Meadows, NW Cambridge, Northstowe and Cambridge East. In response to the level of growth we have been actively involved in preparing and now delivering the **Strategic Sports Facility Strategy** and the **Arts and Culture Strategies** for the Cambridge Sub Region

- 15 This Community and Cultural Strategy is about giving you an overview of the work that is going on within the Council's Community Services Section, how it links to wider commitments and strategies within Cambridgeshire and ends with an action plan and time frame that details what can be achieved with existing resources and partnerships; this action plan will be reviewed and extended each year.

- 16 The document is divided into 3 sections:

Section A Community Development
Section B Sports Development
Section C Arts Development

The document also highlights a number of case studies throughout, which give a flavour of our work. (to come)

SECTION A - COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

- 17 **Active, safe and healthy communities**

A priority role of community development for South Cambridgeshire District Council is to enable existing and future residents to live in active, safe and healthy communities. We encourage and support residents to be actively involved in their community through events and initiatives that are accessible to all such as parish plans, youth activities, community groups and events and residents' associations. The government white paper published in November 2006 prioritises community engagement alongside a greater role for the voluntary sector and devolved powers to parish councils. Some actions in this strategy are about delivering support to communities to enable them to place themselves in a position where they can derive most benefit from current government policy.

- 18 **Good access to services and enabling communities**

We encourage residents and organisations to be active in their own community by working with them to identify the resources they need to develop and sustain local projects. We also provide grant aid, training, information and advice to support the development of sustainable organisations and raise the confidence and skills of the members in the process.

- 19 Community Development Officers work in partnership with voluntary, community and statutory organisations to enable the provision of relevant information and resources about health and safety issues, external funding opportunities and county wide government led initiatives. An example of the latter is the Cambridgeshire Compact which is a joint agreement about how

statutory and voluntary organisations can work more effectively together in the delivery of services. Allied to this is the Cambridgeshire Funders Group which is involved in looking at how to establish simplified joint funding processes.

- 20 We provide good access to services by working with service providers, such as the CAB, Care Network, Age Concern and youth services, to deliver outreach services directly to residents within their communities. And we encourage these organisations to add value to the funding we give them by providing information about external funding. This is provided in a variety of ways, such as advice from members of the Community Services team, the Funding Toolkit which is available on the council's website and the free Funding Fair which also offers workshops from funding and training organisations. We also signpost to Cambridge City and South Cambs CVS and Cambridgeshire ACRE with whom we work closely to deliver infrastructure support to voluntary and community organisations.
- 21 Community Access Points are an additional facility located in a number of villages across the district. These computer points are managed by volunteers and provide learning opportunities facilitated by the County Council, liC and the local Learning Partnership
- 22 **Successful new communities**
We are planning for a wide range of community facilities and infrastructure for all of the major growth areas in South Cambs. This includes working in partnership with colleagues from Cambridge City Council in planning for new developments which straddle both local authorities. We work with Legal and Planning Officers to develop and agree on new governance structures required and we work to ensure that adequate resources are secured to enable the sustainability of new community facilities and open spaces into the future.
- 23 We support and inform the planning and development of these new communities through consultation, engagement and information sharing with residents and partnership organisations in existing and 'new' communities. This includes development of a Community Development Plan for Northstowe
- 24 We also work with planning officers to oversee the successful delivery of community facilities and infrastructure in major growth sites, in accordance with Section 106 agreements.

SECTION B - SPORTS DEVELOPMENT

25 Active safe and healthy communities

There is no doubt that the announcement of the London 2012 Olympic and Paralympic games has got people bursting with excitement and expectations about how this major event will play a part locally. Sport and physical activity already play a major role within many villages and provides people of all ages and abilities the opportunity to be active. Sport also provides an opportunity for learning new skills, volunteering and spectators. 2012 will not only bring improved funding, coaching resources and player pathways for talented athletes but it will also leave a lasting legacy of improvement and participation in sport within our community sport clubs. This can only be a positive outcome with the ever increasing obesity figures and other related illnesses due to being overweight and inactive.

- 26 The recommended level of participation to obtain general health benefits for adults is for thirty minutes of at least moderate intensity physical activity, on five or more days per week and for young people an hour of moderate intensity physical activity daily. The actions for this section really highlights the continuation of working with key partners to develop schemes and opportunities for talent identification, reducing obesity levels and targeting members of our communities that are not currently engaging in sport or being physically active.

27 Good access to services and enabling communities

To enable effective delivery of sport and physical activity, the provision of adequate facilities is crucial. Run down or lack of facilities is a major barrier to participation and reduces the opportunities for clubs to develop and new projects to be run. Other major barriers include; poor disabled access, high costs and transport issues. This Council plays a major enabling role to ensure communities have access to funding and support and advice to develop and improve local facilities. The dual-use capital investment in to sports facilities by this Council has not only assisted projects in securing external funding but has also increased opportunities for paid employment, access to facilities during the school day and improved activities for the whole community.

- 28 The village sports clubs that are based on recreation grounds and other local facilities provide excellent access for grass route sports. Community Sports clubs can be the hub of the community and investment in to these facilities ensure the future provision of clubs and activities for the local community. The actions for this section highlights the priority for completing the dual-use capital investment in to sports facilities at Impington and Gamlingay and the continuation of the support we currently offer to Parish Council's, sports clubs and community groups through the Village Sports Facility and Youth Sports Initiative grants.

29 Successful new communities

Thoughtful planning to ensure that new communities have adequate access to sport and recreation facilities is key to reducing social isolation and reduced activity levels in growth areas such as Cambourne, Arbury Park, Northstowe, Cambridge Southern Fringe and Cambridge East. Working with key partners and housing developers to assess local needs, highlight quality standards and

the best location and provide management options are all steps in ensuring affordable and accessible sport and recreation facilities. Careful consideration of trigger points and support for sports development working with new residents is essential in providing activity on the ground. Funding advice and assistance with setting up sports clubs and activity sessions is key to providing new residents with good access to services and enabling them to develop in to a strong and successful community.

- 30 The actions for this section highlights the need to input in to Sport and Recreation strategies within each growth area including the S106 agreements. This includes delivery of a wide range of community sports facilities in accordance with nationally approved standards but given local interpretation including consultation with the sports governing bodies. We will take a proactive approach to the successful e when facilities are delivered and new communities start to form.

SECTION C - ARTS DEVELOPMENT

31 The aspiration of South Cambridgeshire District Council in the arts is to promote participation to quality arts activities in the widest variety of art forms for all residents. The Arts Development Officer encourages residents and organisations to identify the facilities, skills and resources required to initiate, develop and sustain arts projects. The arts plan for the next five years goes some way to meeting the standards for local authority arts services set by the Department of Culture Media and Sport and Arts Council England (for more information please contact the Arts Development Officer).

32 **Active , safe and healthy communities**

We are committed to fostering active, safe and healthy communities through a range of arts development schemes in partnership with village colleges, key agencies and arts organisations. For example with the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Mental Health Partnership Trust in setting up positive arts experiences (voice, dance, ceramics) for isolated, elderly residents and groups to promote healthy lifestyles; or offering both young and old the chance to create short films as part of the *Inside Stories* programme, used to consult with young people on parish plans, celebrate the heritage of a village or simply as a way of capturing people's stories in a changing world.

33 **Good Access to services and enabling communities**

Good access to services is provided chiefly through the work of local arts development managers, funded – through the dual use arts scheme - in partnership with certain village colleges. The colleges facilitate a range of community-led arts projects strengthening membership of arts groups, building networks, encouraging volunteering, promoting youth arts projects and identifying new sources of income. There are currently four local arts development managers employed by Village Colleges promoting arts activity across most of the District, reaching a wide range of the communities including vulnerable and isolated groups. Under the name *START – supporting arts development* the managers provide a number of joint development projects including:

- **The List Live** - a free online resource for community groups, artists and others that helps to demonstrate the rich cultural mix of South Cambridgeshire. It is a searchable directory of local providers, groups, facilities, artists, agencies and more. Organisations and artists can add their details free in one of 6 categories. Visitors to the site can search the database for details of groups they would like to join, artists they might want to work with or venues they might want to book. The site is moderated by a local arts development manager and is regularly updated. Cambridge City Council also supports the scheme. The List Live can be found at www.start-arts.org.uk
- **The South Cambs Equipment Bank** - containing radio microphone sound system, lighting rig and a mobile cinema kit is available to hire at low cost to community groups in South Cambridgeshire. Hirers receive training in its use along with advice on licensing and copyright, marketing, publicity and

fundraising. A local arts development manager manages the scheme and seminars.

34 **Successful new communities**

The Arts Development Officer is engaged in planning for arts facilities and infrastructure as part of housing and population growth in order to help enable successful new communities. This includes working in partnership with colleagues from Cambridgeshire County Council and Cambridge City Council in planning for new arts facilities within community, health and education settings as well as actively encouraging existing and new creative industries. This work involves close consultation with residents, partner organisations and developers
